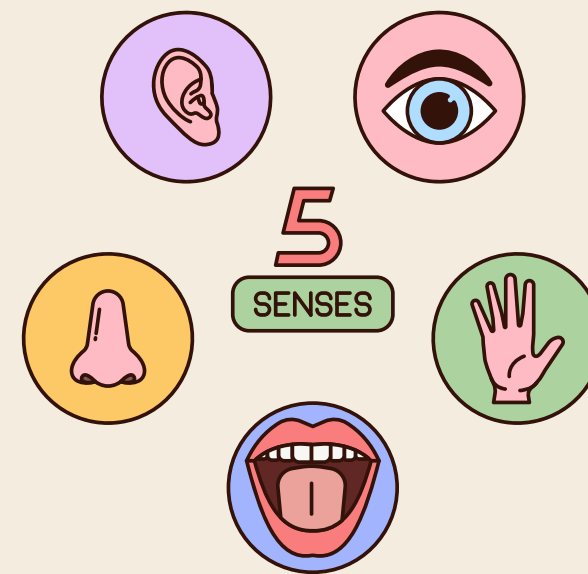




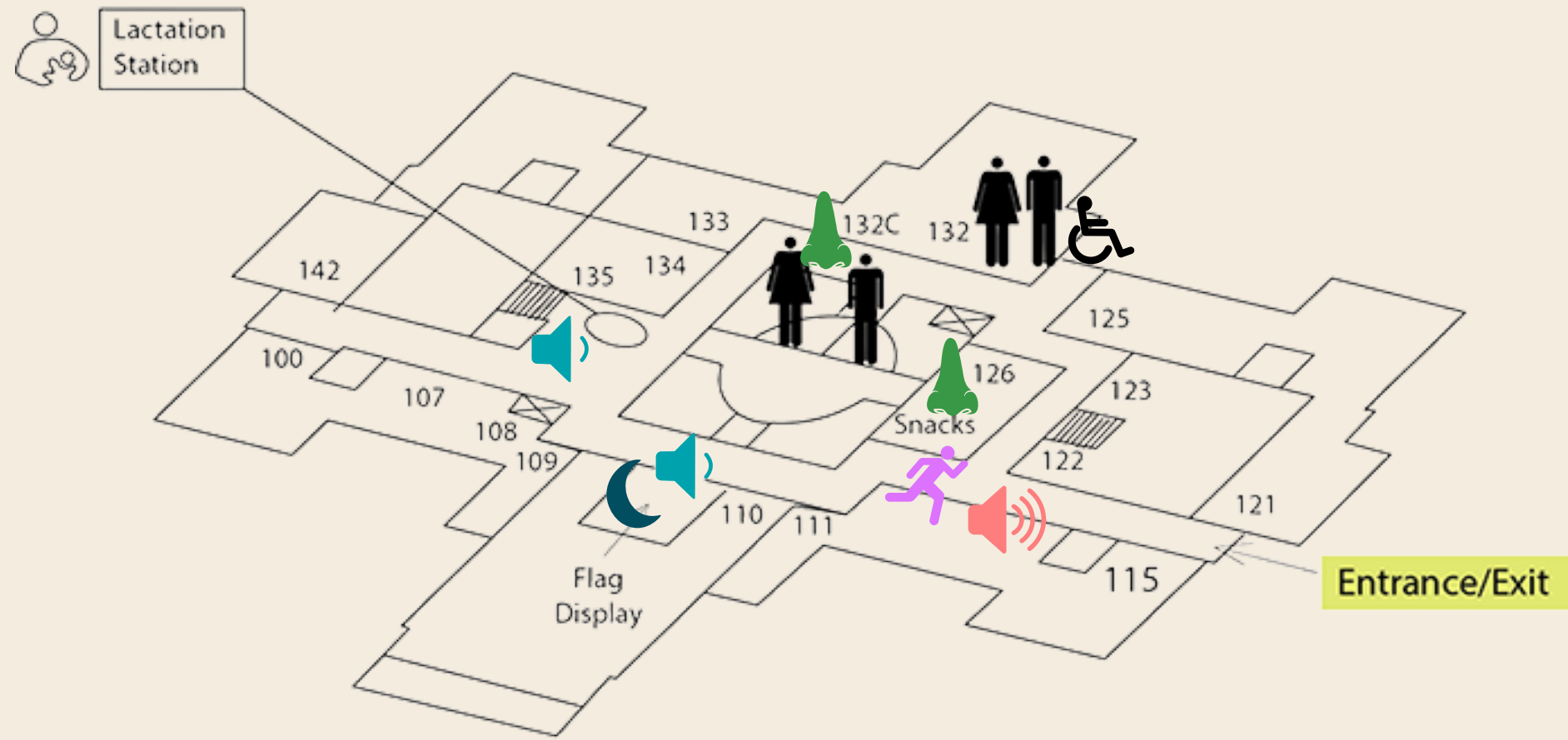
A Sensory Map of the Georgia State Capitol

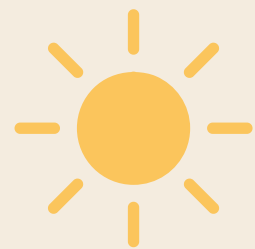

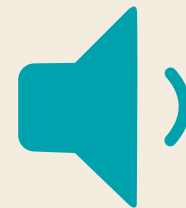

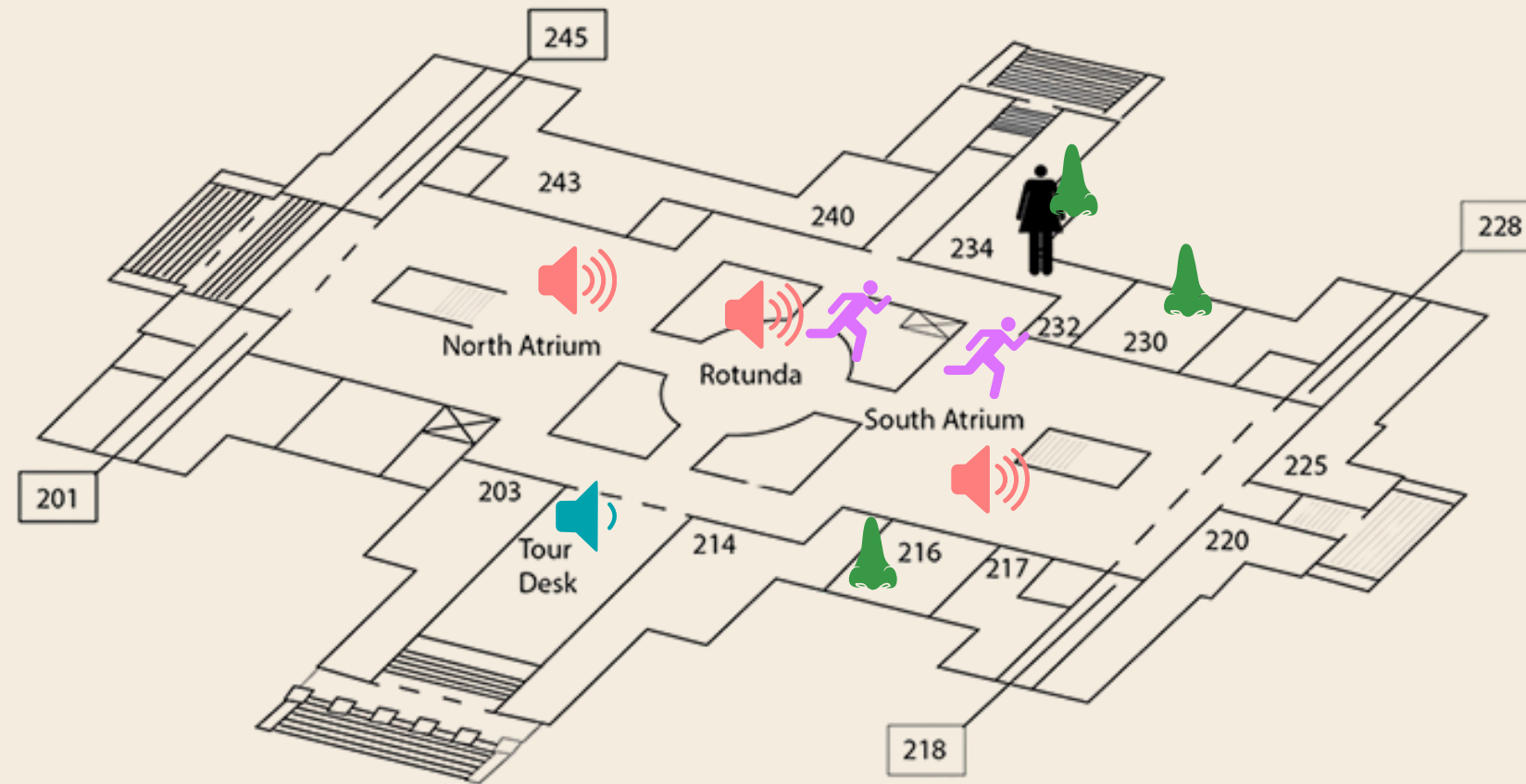

Secretary of State (214)

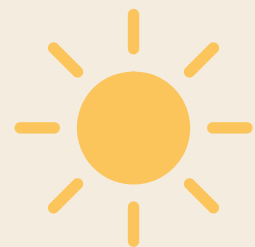

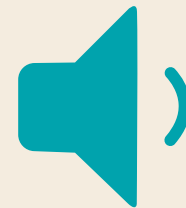
Museum tour desk

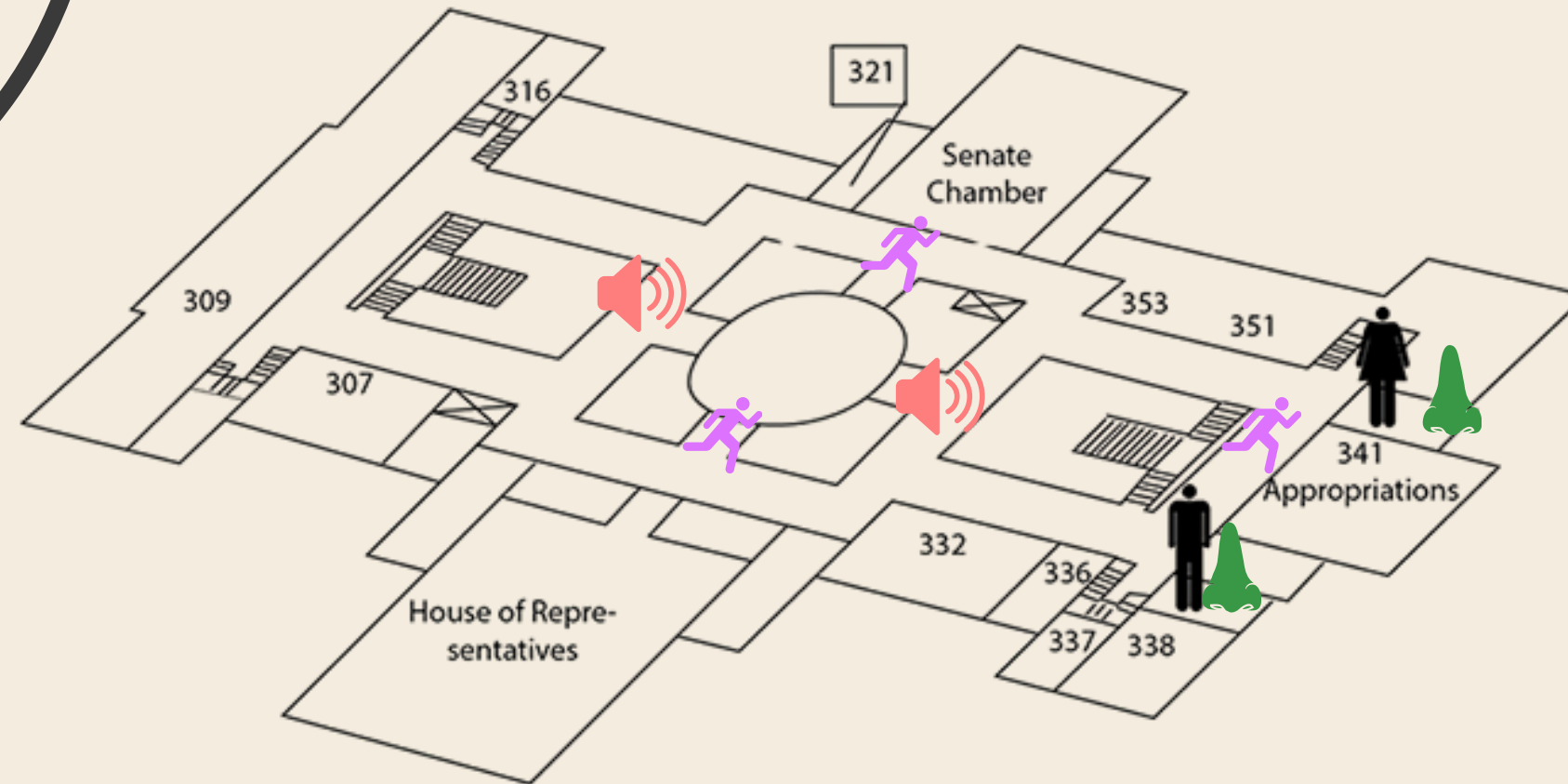

Speaker of the House (332)

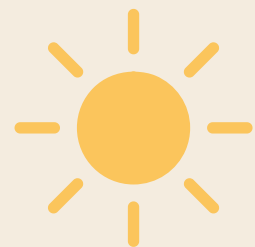
Clerk of the House (309)

Secretary of the Senate (351)

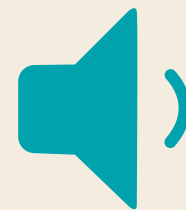


Notes:

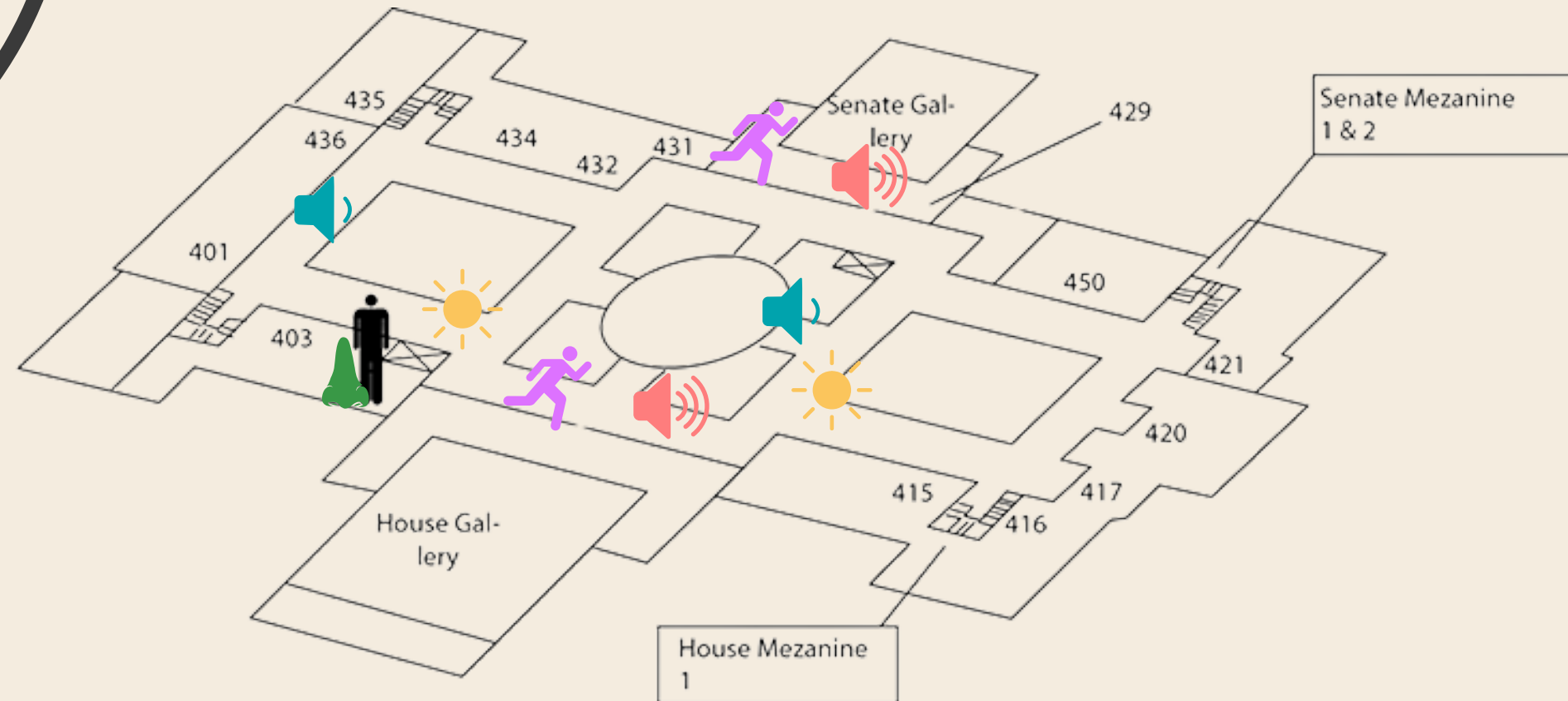

Fourth Floor

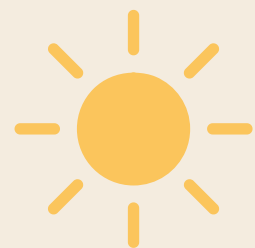
Georgia Capitol Museum exhibits

Exhibits on this floor interpret Georgia wildlife, agriculture, politics, and history.

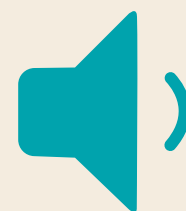
House and Senate public galleries

Notes:

- During legislative session (January to late March/early April), the fourth floor can be busy and loud, particularly in the mornings. By the afternoon, the fourth floor is typically less busy.
- The lighting can be very bright on the fourth floor, especially when exiting the elevator.

Restrooms:

- Women's restrooms are located on the first, second, and third floors.
- Men's restrooms are located on the first, third, and fourth floors.
- The all-gender and accessible restroom is located on the first floor.

Wheelchairs and Scooters:

- Courtesy wheelchairs and scooters are available near the security desk on the first floor upon entry. They are available on the first come, first served basis, and must be checked out using a sign-up sheet (typically a bright orange color).
